School Annual Education Report (AER) Cover Letter

Dear Parents and Community Members:

We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER), which provides key information on the 2021-22 educational progress for the Zemmer 8/9 Campus. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by federal and state laws. The school's report contains information about student assessment, accountability, and teacher quality. If you have any questions about the AER, please contact Jeff Stanton, building principal, for assistance.

For the 2021-22 school year, schools were identified based on previous years' performance using definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that had at least one underperforming student subgroup in 2021-22. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that had a student subgroup performing at the same level as the lowest 5% of all schools in the state in 2021-22. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance was in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state or had a graduation rate at or below 67% in 2021-22. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no label is given.

Our school HAS NOT BEEN GIVEN ONE OF THESE LABELS.

Some key challenges the school faces include:

- Declining enrollment
- Increasing numbers of free and reduced students
- High number of at-risk students
- Recovery from the 2020 pandemic

To help improve in these areas, Zemmer has undertaken several key initiatives. These include:

- School improvement process (SIP)
- Professional development aligned with school improvement goals and district board goals
- Professional learning communities (PLC) meeting weekly
- Advanced placement opportunities
- Math and Reading intervention classes for at-risk students
- iConnect classes to focused on reading and improving building culture (Positivity Project)
- Academic Support for Students
- Schoolwide PBIS process
- Guided Academics Programs for at-risk students in Math (aligned with MTSS guidelines)
- Virtual class options
- Numerous athletic and club opportunities for students
- Bi-weekly attendance meetings with Lapeer County Truancy Department
- Kagan Cooperative Learning Strategy Implementation
- Professional Development focused on MDE Essential Practices in Disciplinary Literacy

State law requires that we also report additional information.

1. PROCESS FOR ASSIGNING PUPILS TO THE SCHOOL

Students attending Lapeer Community Schools are assigned to school buildings based on their residence. Parents may request that their children attend different buildings by completing an In-District Schools of Choice Request and submitting it to any school building in the district. Details regarding the Schools-of-Choice process can be obtained from the district website, www.lapeerschools.org

All students in 8th and 9th grade within the district do attend Zemmer as it is the only 8/9 building. Several students will take classes at Lapeer High School though and are shuttled between buildings to accommodate their class offerings.

2. THE STATUS OF THE 3-5 YEAR SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

Goal 1: All Zemmer students will be proficient in Reading.

Goal 2: All Zemmer students will be proficient in Math.

Goal 3: All Zemmer students will be proficient in Writing.

Goal 4: All Zemmer students will be proficient in Social Studies.

Goal 5: All Zemmer students will be proficient in Science.

Goal 6: All Zemmer students will be career and college ready by graduation

3. A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF EACH SPECIALIZED SCHOOL

Specialized schools provide alternative educational opportunities for students on either a part-time or full-time basis. In addition to the regular K-12 program provided by Lapeer Community Schools, the district has students attending five specialized school programs: Special education for the most severely handicapped students, Community High School, Lapeer County Educational and Technical Center and two options utilizing the Year-Round calendar at both the K-5 and 6-8 grade levels.

- The Lapeer Intermediate School District offers programs for the most severe mentally, physically and emotionally impaired students. Most of these programs are housed at the Lapeer County Educational and Technical Center.
- •Lapeer Community High School serves "at-risk" youths ages 14-18 in an alternative environment. The school provides a curriculum designed to develop employability and social skills as well as academic skills. A range of services address problems such as poor attendance, poor academic performance and behavioral issues.
- The Center for Innovation at the West Campus is a program that will offer series of project based learning classes, a Project Lead the Way science program for students in grades 6-12, college on campus courses, and other programs. Many students in grades 6-12 will opt to spend a portion of their day at the CFI campus in order to take advantage of these many educational options.

- The Lapeer County Educational and Technical Center provides vocational education and related services to high school students from all of the county high schools. Students in the 15 programs learn job specific skills to help them prepare for employment upon graduation. They also learn academic skills in an applied setting.
- Lapeer Community School's Year-Round Middle School is a program for students in grades 6-7 that operates on a balanced calendar. Students attend school the same number of days as traditional calendar students, but have a shorter summer break and more frequent week-long breaks during the school year. This program is housed at Rolland-Warner Campus 6/7 building during August. Students in grades 6-7 will begin their year on this campus and then students in grade 8 will relocate to the Zemmer 8/9 campus in September. Approximately 100 students participated in the Year-Round Middle School program this past school year.
- Turrill Year-Round Elementary School is a program for students in grades E5-5 that operates on a balanced calendar. Students attend school the same number of days as traditional calendar students, but have a shorter summer break and more frequent week -long breaks during the school year. During these week-long breaks, students can opt to attend intercession camps for a nominal fee. Turrill has over 450 students that take advantage of this option for their elementary school years.
